

Fourth Sunday of Advent Isaiah 7:10-14 Romans 1:1-17 St. Matthew 1:18-24



This weekend, the Church celebrates the Fourth Sunday of the *Advent Season*; a season that is quickly coming to an end. The overall theme is one of trust. The mark of a true disciple is demonstrated in the ability and the desire to trust in God's providence even in the midst of trials and tribulations. The scriptures for this weekend provide two different pictures of man's response to God.

In the book of the Prophet Isaiah, the prophet describes Ahaz, the king of Judah who is unwilling to yield to God's *Word* and decides *not* to trust in God's providence. Ahaz appears to have more reverence for the opinions of man than he has for God. Ahaz is a good example of those in society who place more confidence in man and the material world then in God and His providence.



Such individuals continue to accumulate material treasures in this world instead of looking in anticipation to the kingdom of God. Such individuals eventually realize as did Ahaz that the feelings of emptiness result from an inability or unwillingness to place God at the center of their lives and life choices.

St. Matthew gives another picture in his description of St. Joseph, the foster father of Jesus. Matthew describes Joseph as a man of deep faith. His faith is demonstrated by his trust in God's *Word*. Genuine faith leads to trust in the powers beyond earthly experiences, placing trust in God's providential love and mercy. Openness to the ways in which God's *Word* permeates life and life choices inevitably leads to a desire to be obedient when confronted by the magnitude of God's presence along with His mysterious ways.

Joseph was just this sort of man. He was an upright man of integrity who desired to listen to God's *Word* and in listening, to carry out God's will. Like Mary, Joseph never saw the whole picture. He was never sure where it was that God was leading him. Nevertheless, he chose to put his hand to the plough and permitted faith to be his guide.

Engagement, Betrothal, Nuptials

Plans that Joseph and Mary must have made with regard to life as a married couple took an unintended turn when at the announcement of the angel, Mary was told that she would conceive and give birth to the Son of God. This was a confusing and bewildering beginning to a courtship that initially must have been a clear-cut and happy anticipation for marriage.

Matthew indicates that Joseph was betrothed to Mary and then he is said to be in the process of divorcing Mary as a result of this unexpected pregnancy about which he knew nothing. Yet, prior to the actual nuptials, Mary is referred to as being the wife of Joseph. The relationship about which Matthew describes was actually the normal procedure in which there were three steps that eventually led up to the actual marriage ceremony.

Step One: The Engagement

The engagement was often made by the two sets of parents. This usually took place when the individuals were still children. Therefore, the future spouses neither participated nor consented. It was often the case that they did not know one another.

For the Jews, marriage was a serious and sacred commitment. It was not to be left to the whims of young adolescent hearts. Rather, it was the responsibility of adults to make wise choices in selecting the mates for their children.

Step Two: The Betrothal

The betrothal was understood as the confirmation and approval of the engagement. It was during this year-long period of betrothal that the engagement could be dissolved if either party did not choose to go forward with the nuptials.



During the year of betrothal, the couple was referred to as husband and wife (actually man and wife), without the rights and privileges that come with the married state. It was during this period that the union could not be broken without an actual written statement of divorce, referred to as a *writ of divorce*.


Step Three: Nuptials

The marriage ceremony concluded the year-long betrothal. It was at this stage that Matthew indicates Joseph's intention to divorce Mary as a result of her pregnancy about which he had no claim.



"This is how the birth of Jesus came about. When his mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Joseph her husband, since he was a righteous man, yet unwilling to expose her to shame, decided to divorce her quietly" (1:18-19).

Matthew refers to Joseph as a "righteous man," which for the Jews meant that he was a devout observer of the Mosaic Law. Joseph wanted to dissolve his union with Mary because of his belief that she had violated the Law. And the Law in fact actually required that Joseph act in such a manner. Matthew also indicates that Joseph was, "unwilling to expose her to shame." The penalty for proven adultery was death by stoning according to the Mosaic Law as it is described in The Book of Deuteronomy.



"But if this charge is true [adultery] and the evidence of the girl's virginity is not found, they shall bring the girl to the entrance of her father's house and there her townsmen shall stone her to death, because she committed a crime against Israel by her unchasteness in her father's house. Thus, shall you purge the evil from your midst" (Deuteronomy 22:20-21).

This is the reason for Matthew's description of Joseph not only as a righteous man, but also as a faithful, gentle soul. Joseph wanted to prevent the horrific shame and scandal that such an infraction of the Law would bring to the house of Joachim and Ann, the parents of Mary. This righteous behavior and reverence for God are contrasted in this week's readings with the unrighteousness and irreverence of Ahaz, the king of Judah.

Ahaz: The Historical Setting

Ahaz was the king of Judah and not a reputable one at that. He lacked honesty, integrity and respect for God and God's Law. At age nineteen, for example, Ahaz killed his only son and heir to the throne by making his son an offering to the pagan gods. Moreover, Ahaz had little or no regard for the *Word* of God in his life. The background for Isaiah's message in this week's first reading focuses on Ahaz's refusal to seek out the providence and mercy of God. Instead he seeks an alliance with the world. As is the case even in our twenty-first century, the world inevitably betrays Ahaz leaving him with neither power nor dignity.

The kings of Syria and Israel are banding together against Judah and are in the process of overthrowing Judah in order to reduce it to rubble. Syria was intent on creating an empire. Isaiah predicted the eventual destruction of Syria, which would give way to the emergence of another powerful kingdom. A child would be born precisely for this new kingdom and he would reign forever on the throne of David.

"The Spirit of the Lord would dwell on him and he would rule the world with justice" (Isaiah 11:1-6, [Second week of Advent]).


In killing his son, Ahaz is left with no possible heir from the line of David. Ahaz knows that he will be the last king to rule Judah from the line of David. Isaiah tells Ahaz to turn to God for direction.

"The Lord spoke to Ahaz, saying, 'Ask for a sign from the Lord, your God; let it be deep as the nether world, or high as the sky'" (Isaiah 7: 10-11).

Ahaz refuses to implore the mercy of God and instead he turns to Syria, which was getting ready to attack Judah. Thus, in order to become an ally with Syria, Ahaz agrees to erect pagan temples for the worship of pagan gods. This of course did not help Judah.

Ahaz gives a lame excuse for not imploring the mercy of God, which while it appears to be a pious gesture on the part of Ahaz, it is actually more characteristic of Ahaz's indifference and arrogance.

"But Ahaz answered, 'I will not tempt the Lord!' Then Isaiah said: 'Listen, O house of David! Is it not enough for you to weary people, must you also weary my God?'" (Isaiah 7:12-13).



Isaiah persists, telling Ahaz to trust in the Lord and to beseech the Lord who will grant him anything he asks for despite his lack of faith. God will show His mercy and in addition He will prove to Ahaz that He is the one true God.

Ahaz refuses. He chooses not to trust in God. Isaiah is not very pleased with Ahaz's stubbornness and his lack of reverence for the Lord. Yet despite the fact that Ahaz will not budge, God will nevertheless give a sign to Ahaz whether he wants one or not. This will be a sign that will perpetuate and at the same time protect the throne of David. The sign is to be an heir for Ahaz, a son who will succeed Ahaz and will restore hope for a weary nation.

"Therefore, the Lord himself will give you this sign: the virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall name him Emmanuel" (Isaiah 7:14).



The above passage is not a prophecy of Mary and the birth of Jesus. The Hebrew word (<u>almah</u>), used to describe the wife of Ahaz does not describe a virgin per se, but depicts a young woman, a mature woman who is approaching marriage. The word (<u>almah</u>) does not convey the meaning of unspotted virginity as does the Hebrew word, <u>bethulah</u>, which also carries with it the notion of a young woman who still lives with her parents as is the situation with Mary.

The reference to Emmanuel is also not a reference to Christ but rather, a John the Baptist figure. This Emmanuel will be a precursor for Christ. His name will be Hezekiah, the son of Ahaz, who will succeed his father and begin to restore Judah with religious reform.

Unfortunately, it would be too late for Judah to realize any type of reform. Ahaz failed to recognize the fact that Syria was the real enemy; thus, while Ahaz spent time courting the king of Syria, Syria betrayed Ahaz and eventually left Judah a ruined mess.

The real hope not only for Judah but for all the nations of the world would be the coming of the *Second David*, the *Branch*. He will be the Ideal King because he will be *Shepherd* (*Kalos*); the *Ideal Shepherd* about whom Isaiah wrote in Chapter 11.

The Messiah when he comes will not need weapons or armies because his sword will be his words and his armor will consist of justice given to all equally. The Messiah of God will be the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies as the *Lord* of Lords, the *King* of Kings and the *Prince* of Peace, once and for all times. **JNM**


New Year's Resolutions 2023

It is the time of the year to begin thinking about some New Year's resolutions. With the start of each new year, most of us begin to think of ways to improve ourselves and thus, to begin to set goals for which to strive. Sadly, most of these well-intentioned resolutions are quickly forgotten. In order to make positive and impactful changes in your life when setting resolutions, be sure to keep them realistic.



Personal Goals

Reflect on those aspects of your life that would benefit from some kind of change, and then decide how much *meaning* this alteration might make in your life. One of the most popular resolutions each year is to lose weight; yet, this too, is often times very hard to commit to. Why? Too often, people want a quick-fix to losing weight; consequently, they adopt one of the several *fad diets* such as *Keto* or *South Beach* that seemly do help people lose weight, initially, but often fail long term because old habits are hard to break.



Losing weight is not about following a diet; Rather, it is about making <u>lifestyle changes</u>. To successfully lose weight, it takes time, effort and in additional, both emotional and spiritual drive.

The Plan

Making a *vague* plan to "lose weight" or "exercise more" are goals that lack substance; thus, such vague plans are easily unattainable. A better plan is to set a specific goal, which includes the following:

•Exercise 30 minutes, 4 times per week or to lose 10 pounds in one month.

Having a plan and a clear goal can help in the visualizing of the targeted progress. Change can be difficult; thus, it is important to stick to a program that is both realistic and challenging. However, this takes effort.



Maintaining the mindset that a positive change is part of the goal requires a commitment until that change becomes part of your lifestyle. Individuals who can maintain or engage in efforts to change behavior and do it for 6 to 8 weeks are most likely able to support that effort long term.

Realistic Resolutions

Some suggestions for attainable and healthy New Year's resolutions worthy of consideration include the following:

◆Eat whole foods, including vegetables, fruits, nuts, seeds, whole grains and fish.

The above foods contain a plethora of nutrients that the body needs to function at an optimal level. The data has proven that eating whole foods decreases the risk of heart disease and type 2 diabetes.

◆Improve sleep habits. In other words, get more quality sleep.

Sleep is essential to maintain good health. Poor quality sleep can increase the risk for weight gain, heart disease and depression. It is important to decrease screen time before bed, limit caffeine and alcohol, and get into bed at the same time each night. The body needs quality rest and sleep. Aim for 7 to 8 hours of sleep most days of the week.

•Cook more meals at home. Research shows people who cook more at home have better quality and less body fat than people who eat more meals on the go.

Eating out in restaurants, the food tends to be higher in sodium and fat, which increases the risk for high blood pressure, heart disease and diabetes.

◆Spend more time out-of-doors. Outdoor activities can improve mental health by reducing stress, elevating mood and lowering blood pressure.

Making a New Year's resolution to spend more time in the fresh air every day is a sustainable and healthy goal that can be achievable for everyone. Take daily short walks, whether it be around the block or to the mailbox. Reflect on the beauty of the sun and incorporate nature into your daily routine.

◆Limit screen time. Turn off cell phones and computers.


Spending too much time on electric devices in particular, social media has been associated with anxiety, depression and loneliness. Set a resolution to reduce the amount of time watching TV, scrolling through social media or surfing the internet.

◆Try mediation. Meditating can improve mental health and wellbeing. It has been proven to reduce stress and anxiety.

It is easy to find books, podcasts or apps that teach one how to mediate. Meditation can also improve sleep patterns if practiced on a regular basis.

• Be more present. Research has shown that being more present can and does improve life satisfaction by decreasing negative thoughts, which can improve psychological health.

Implementing a New Year's resolution to be more present may also increase happiness in everyday life. Spending *less* time on the phone, texting, or on social media allows more time to listen intently to others. Making human connections is important to keep the spirit vibrant and necessary for emotional wellbeing.



Rediscover the beauty that you possess both on the outside and inside. Believe in yourself! Have no regrets! The past is the past, learn from it! Live your life as you want to, not as what others expect of you. Be true to yourself!


Optimum Resolution

CHRISTMAS CRECHE



St. Francis of Assisi is credited with having created the first Christmas crèche. It was the year 1223, three years before Francis' death and one year prior to his receiving the stigmata, the five wounds of Christ. This is also the year that Francis received approval from Rome. Pope Innocent III gave permission for the establishment of the Franciscan Order, the Order of Friars Minor (OFM).

Francis had recently returned to Assisi from Rome with the good news from the pope; thus, the young friar wanted to celebrate his joy and to thank God in a very special way. Because it was near to the Feast of Christmas, Francis desired to recreate the birth at Bethlehem as a way of inspiring the village people to receive the Christ Child with both joy and awe. Francis wanted to demonstrate God's love with the sending of His Son into the world who was born *not* in luxury but in poverty, and in stark simplicity.




Locating a small cave in his little town of Greccio, Francis enlisted the help of friends and townspeople in preparing the little cave with straw and live animals, an ox and a donkey. The manager was a stone slab upon which Francis placed a little baby. The people in the town marched in procession with candles. The flame was meant to depict Jesus as the *Light of the world; Light* shining through darkness. Midnight Mass was celebrated and Francis who was a deacon preached about God's love in sending His Son to be born in simplicity and poverty, destined to suffer greatly out of love for humankind.

Greccio is a little hill town in Italy in the providence of Lazio, which is located north of Florence. There is a small shrine in the town that contains what is believed to be the actual slab of stone used for the First Christmas Crèche in 1223.
