

#### From the Pastor's Pen

Divine Mercy Sunday Second Sunday of Easter John 20:19-31



On this the second Sunday in the Easter Season, the Church focuses attention on the love and infinite mercy of Jesus. St. John's gospel account describes Jesus' appearance to his disciples who had locked themselves in a small room, hidden from the world for fear that the Jews and Romans would imprison and possibly kill them (John 20:19-31). This is Jesus' first meeting with his disciples as a group since they left him; abandoned him in the Garden of Gethsemane on the night prior to his crucifixion. This first Sunday after Easter is called *Divine Mercy Sunday*, which has been instituted at the request of Jesus, himself, due to the faith experience of Sister Mary Faustina Kowalska, a Polish-born member of the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy.

#### **Divine Mercy & Sister Faustina**

Sister Mary Faustina was born in Glogowie, Poland in 1905 to a poor peasant family. One of ten children, Mary Faustina worked outside the home at an early age as a maid and housekeeper to help with the financial support of the family. Mary Faustina was also a very devout child and at an early age appears to have developed an appreciation and a desire for cultivating a spiritual bond with Jesus. She loved to pray; thus, she spent hours throughout her day contemplating the love and the mercy of Jesus as she went about her daily chores. Perhaps, this is the reason that God chose Mary Faustina to convey to the Church and to the world, the message of *Divine Mercy*.



Mary Faustina entered religious life in the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy on August 1, 1925. She would spend the remainder of her brief life serving the needs of the community as a cook, gardener and porter. Mary Faustina lived a life of humble service, silently laboring for the good of the community in spite of her agonizing, yet silent suffering due to physical pain; a pain that she freely accepted and endured.

Throughout her years, Mary Faustina was the recipient of numerous visions from Jesus who entrusted this young devout nun with a three-fold mission: (1) to remind the world about the compassion and mercy of Jesus; (2) to instruct the faithful and especially those who had lapsed in their faith to return to the Lord and to embrace his mercy; (3) to promote devotion to the mercy of Jesus by reminding others of the need to acquire a child-like trust in God by their demonstration of mercy and love toward their neighbor.



Mary Faustina was instructed by her spiritual director to keep a journal; thus, it is in her own words that the Church and eventually the world would come to know God's desire for humankind. According to Faustina, it was the will of God that humankind would embrace His mercy, and once again, men and women would begin trusting in His unfailing love. After one particular appearance of Jesus, Faustina records the words of the Lord who informed her that, "The souls who spread the honor of my mercy, I will shield through their entire life and at the hour of death, I will not be a judge for them, but the Merciful Savior" (III.20-21).

#### **Divine Mercy Sunday**



"Humanity will not find peace until it turns trustfully to divine mercy."
(St Faustina's Diary, p. 132)

It was the desire of Jesus that Sister Faustina convey to a world steeped in sin and mistrust, the unfailing mercy of Jesus and of his desire that all mankind including his priests and bishops begin to trust in him. *Divine Mercy* is neither new nor is it novel. The *Divine Mercy* of the Lord forms the basic message of the New Testament and most particularly the writings of the four evangelists.

In his desire for devotion to his *Divine Mercy*, Jesus also indicated to Faustina that the Sunday immediately following Easter must be designated as *Mercy Sunday*. In addition, it was the desire of Jesus that the Gospel of St. John 20:19-31 be proclaimed. This particular episode in John's account describes Jesus' unexpected visit to his eleven Apostles; this being his first appearance to them in bodily form since his resurrection. The account describes a compassionate and forgiving Lord who seeks not retribution but renewed trust and faith.

#### John 20:19-31

John indicates that, "When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you'" (20:19).

Jesus could have said so many things to his disciples. He could have scolded them for their lack of loyalty in leaving him as prey at the hands of the Roman soldiers. He could have expressed to Peter an "I told you so" attitude and his disappointment at Peter's predicted betrayal at a moment when Jesus could have really used a friend. In addition, Jesus could have reprimanded the disciples for not remembering all that he had told them about the "Third Day."

Jesus could have asked the disciples why they continued with their suspicious skepticism and their distrust about his rising from the dead, *even* after they visited the *empty tomb*. Perhaps Jesus could have questioned why the disciples thought that the women who enthusiastically brought the news of his rising, having seen the empty tomb and the linens that wrapped his body, and then having spoken with him, were not worthy of their belief.



Jesus could have said many things to the disciples, pointing to their lack of loyalty as well as their refusal to believe, yet, he did not. Instead, Jesus says to them, "Peace be with you" (John 20:19). Coming from the Greek, the word for peace is eirene, describing more than the desire for peace or goodwill toward another. The translation of eirene describes the fullness of goodness, perfection and completeness, devoid of adversity. Eirene in Greek mythology describes the goddess of spring who is also the keeper of the gates of heaven.



The Hebrew equivalent of eirene is shalom, which is more than an expression for peace in the life of another. Shalom is an expression of unconditional goodness and blessings. To greet another with the salutation, "shalom aleichem," is to actually pronounce the full meaning of the word as the sentiment slips from the well-wisher's tongue: "I wish you completeness and wholeness, health, prosperity, harmony of mind, body and spirit, devoid from all conflict, adversity and fear. I wish you every good thing; every possible blessing that any one individual can possibly experience in a lifetime in the the world, and I wish this for you in a spirit of love and deep-rooted tranquility; a peace in spirit beginning and ending at the level of soul."



Wholeness and completeness at the level of man's spiritual core is the kind of "peace" that Jesus was bestowing on his disciples. It was the imparting of such incredible blessings that served not only to drive away their fears, but also encourage and inspire joy.

When I think about Jesus' entrance into the locked room where he found the disciples, I envision a frightened bunch of men who are initially startled as Jesus makes his appearance despite the locked doors. Moments later, however, all their preoccupations, appeared unnecessary, unfounded and would vanish as did their fears, their anger and their guilt for having abandoned Jesus in his hour of need. John tells the reader that, "After he had said this ['Peace be with you'], he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord" (John 20: 20).

Suddenly the non-threatening, all loving, merciful and compassionate Jesus raised their human spirits; thus, enabling them to *re-discover* joy, a joy that they once knew and experienced with their friend and mentor. What a powerful message for twenty-first century Christians as well as for those who have given up on God, religion and other people, and who often times fail to find real meaning and lasting purpose for living and being.



Divine Mercy Sunday provides each of us with an invitation to re-discover peace within our lives; peace that only Jesus can create. Each of us is called to rediscover this peace in a spirit of love, charity and mercy. **JNM**

#### Seasonal allergies





#### What is an allergy?

Tis The season! More than 50 million Americans suffer from allergies and symptoms that bloom as the seasons change.

#### **Spring Allergies**

Spring has arrived and at this time of the year many people will be bothered by seasonal allergies referred to as **hay fever**. Allergies are the body's reaction to a substance that it views as a harmful invader. Coming in contact with harmless substances like pollen may, in fact, cause the body's immune system to react. Substances that cause these reactions are called *antigens*.

When pollen enters the nasal passages of one who is allergic to pollen for example, the body's immune system responds immediately. The immune system mistakenly sees pollen as foreign bodies (invaders); thus, it releases substances that normally identify and attack bacteria, viruses, and other illness causing organisms. These antibodies attack the allergens, which leads to the release of histamines into the bloodstream. Histamines trigger the runny nose, itchy red eyes, sneezing and other symptoms of allergies. Coughing, watery eyes, and dark circles under the eyes are all part of the body's natural reaction to the pollen allergen. In some people, allergic asthma symptoms of wheezing, shortness of breath, coughing and/or chest tightness can be caused by exposure to the pollen.

The following trees are just a few of the culprits that can cause hay fever during the spring months: Alder, Aspen, Beech, Box Elder, Maple, Mulberry, Oak, Palm, Poplar, Willow, Sycamore, Bermuda, June Orchard and Red Top.


#### Summer Allergies

The summer months gives rise to **hay fever**, which gets its name from hay cutting season. The real troublesome offenders are grasses, such as ryegrass and timothy grass as well as certain weeds. According to the Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America, grasses are the most common trigger for people with hay fever.

#### **COVID vs. Seasonal Allergies**

Perhaps, one of the primary concerns of many people as we emerge from a two- year-long shutdown due to the pandemic is the ability for distinguishing between COVID symptoms and allergy symptoms. The pandemic has caused many people to associate common symptoms of seasonal allergies with COVID-19 symptoms. Below is information retrieved from a Venn diagram (Centers of Disease Control CDC):

- ◆The most common symptoms of seasonal allergies are itchy or watery eyes and sneezing.
- ♦ Symptoms most common of COVID-19, include fever and chills, muscle and body aches, a new loss of taste or smell, nausea, vomiting and diarrhea.
- •Symptoms common of both include: coughing, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fatigue, headache, sore throat, congestion and/or a runny nose
- ◆ Seasonal allergies are *not* life-threating whereas the COVID-19 virus can be.



#### **Allergy Tests**

There are two tests that an allergist performs to pinpoint the cause of allergic reactions. These include, skin tests and blood tests (RAST).

#### Skin Test

For the skin tests, a doctor will prick the surface of the skin, usually on the upper arm, and injects a tiny number of suspected allergens. If any allergy exists, the skin will become red, swollen and inflamed causing a small amount of discomfort to the skin. Skin tests give fast results usually within 30 minutes, while for others, the patient needs to wait 24 to 48 hours.

#### **Blood Tests**

Blood is drawn and sent to a lab. More allergens can be tested with blood tests than with skin tests. Blood tests are used to identify seasonal allergies as well as perennial allergies, food, medications, insect bites or bee stings. For chronic conditions such as psoriasis or eczema, blood tests are recommended instead of skin tests in order to prevent further skin irritation. Blood tests take several days for the lab to process, which delays the results.

#### **Treating Seasonal Allergies**

Seasonal allergies are treated in many ways. Most commonly, over-the-counter or prescriptions help suppress the body's immune system providing relief of symptoms. **Antihistamines** can help relieve sneezing, itching, a runny nose and watery eyes. Examples of oral antihistamines are Claritin, Zyrtec and Allegra.

**Oral decongestants** include Sudafed and Afrinol, which provide temporary relief from nasal congestion. Decongestants also come in nasal sprays such as Afrin and Neosynephrine. Nasal sprays should only be used for a few days in a row. Longer term use of decongestant nasal sprays can worsen symptoms (rebound congestion).

A **nasal spray** such as cromolyn sodium nasal spray can ease allergy symptoms and does not have serious side effects. It is most effective when used before symptoms begin. Topical nasal sprays, available by prescription reduce the inflammation in the lining of the nose. These include, Flonase and Nasonex, which are corticosteroids that reduce inflammation and are absorbed in small amounts.

Some allergy medications combine such as an antihistamine with a decongestant. Examples include, Claritin D and Allegra D.



Rinsing the nasal passages with a saline solution is a quick, inexpensive and good way to relieve nasal congestion. Rinsing directly flushes out the mucus and allergens from the nose. A **Neti Pot** is a small container with a spout designed for nasal rinsing. The Neti Pot can be purchased at a health food store or a pharmacy.

#### **Medical Advice**

As always, it is important to talk to your health care provider before taking any medications or trying any alternative treatments to relieve allergy symptoms. The health care provider should be aware of medical history and health conditions and then decide which treatment modality is best to treat seasonal allergies. Certain antihistamines can interfere with anti-hypertensive medications so always confer with your doctor or pharmacist before taking any over-the-counter medication.

For some people, allergy shots (allergen immunotherapy) can be another treatment option. This treatment involves regular injections containing small amounts of the substances that cause the allergy. Through the process of desensitization, the injections reduce the immune reaction that causes the symptoms. Sublingual tablets can also be used to treat some allergies.

#### **Reduce Exposure to Allergy Triggers**

Stay indoors on dry, windy days. The best time to go outdoors is after a good rain, which helps clear pollen from the air. Wear a pollen mask when doing outdoor chores like gardening or mowing the lawn. Avoid hanging laundry outside because pollen can stick to sheets and towels. Remove clothing that is worn outside and always shower to remove pollen from your skin and nose.

Watch the local TV or refer to the internet or newspaper for pollen forecasts and pollen-count levels. If the pollen count is high, begin taking allergy medication *before* symptoms begin.

Avoid outdoor activity in the early morning when the pollen-count ais the highest. Allergies cannot be cured; however, the symptoms can be controlled by using avoidance measures and medications. In severe cases, allergen immunotherapy is an option to control the uncomfortable symptoms associated with seasonal allergies.

Enjoy the Spring and Summer months! They pass quickly. Consequently, do not miss the short season. It should be a time to *re*-energize the body and soul. Make the time to take a walk by the beach. Listen to the sound of the ocean and find inner peace. Be happy and grateful, no matter how difficult life can get. Recognize and find meaning in each day. Never take one day for granted.



The pandemic should have taught each one of us how precious life is and how quickly life can change. The pandemic has taught me that real happiness and purpose in life is different for each person. No matter what meaning is found in life, be sure to cultivate it, and never lose sight of it! **KP**




