Do Not Let Your Hearts Become Troubled (John 14: 1-12)

The Gospel according to St. John for this fifth Sunday of the Easter Season is focused on the beginning of the *Farewell Discourse of Jesus*. The powerfully authoritative discourse of Jesus as he prepares his disciples for his departure from them to the Father leads to a lengthy pronouncement on the nature and existence of *real* love that we will hear next weekend, on the sixth Sunday of Easter (John 14:15-41).




Jesus begins his farewell message by telling his disciples not to let their hearts be *troubled* (14:1). The *troubled heart* about which Jesus speaks goes beyond sadness or mere sentiment. Coming from the Greek *tarasso*, the word *troubled* implies a deep-rooted feeling of hopelessness and frenzied despair resulting in a void: a spiritual and emotional emptiness.

The word *tarasso* is also used by St. John when describing Jesus' feelings toward death and the crowd's lack of faith in him as he stands before the tomb of Lazarus, moments prior to his raising his friend from the dead. St. John tells us that Jesus became *perturbed and deeply troubled* (11: 33, 38).


This expression of a deep-felt hopelessness on the part of Jesus is consistent with St. John's dualism, a writing style that permeates the Fourth Gospel. This dualism is captured by conflict of opposites: light contrasted with darkness; truth with falsity. Jesus is *troubled* because he finds his ministry at odds with the Prince of this world: Satan. Death is the absence of life and where there is no life, there is no truth. Jesus prayed: "Father, thank-you, for hearing me. I know that you always hear me" (11:42-43).

The notion of the *troubled heart* becomes clearer as we understand it in relation to Jesus' use of the metaphor of the *Vine and the Branches* in his description of the relationship between him and his followers (15:1-10).




The *troubled heart* can also be better understood in relation to Jesus' appeal for his faithful followers to keep his commandments. "If you love me, you will keep my commandments" (14:15), along with his assurance that he will never abandon his faithful followers. "I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you" (14:18).

The *true* disciple of Jesus is one who demonstrates his/her love by keeping God's commandments. When man adheres to the commandments, man's heart is not *troubled* because he routinely and spontaneously demonstrates his love through the manner in which he lives his life. In other words, he who truly loves (*agape*), as Jesus intended, *never* experiences a *troubled heart*.




While it is true that man may react to daily crises with anger, grief or sadness, for the man of faith, such emotional responses are fleeting and come and go as situations and circumstances change in man's life. Not so with the *troubled (tarasso)* heart. A troubled heart does not disappear with the superficial circumstances of the moment. Rather, the troubled heart is indicative of a deep-rooted feeling of emptiness at man's spiritual core: at the level of soul.



The *troubled* heart that Jesus describes is a *spiritual void*, which results from man's inability or unwillingness to discover meaning for the moment. It is a meaning for living one's life rooted in a relationship with Jesus. Such a relationship, if authentic, while not preventing the ups and downs due to human failures and weaknesses will allow man to face life with hope.

This is the message that Jesus now gives his disciples: "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me" (14:1-2). This is a command. "Believe!" For if man truly believes, his faith will conquer the world. Jesus is telling his disciples not to allow the world to get between them and him.



The world and all its untruths, as appealing at times as it may be will distract man from seeking Truth. Jesus is the Truth, and as long as man believes, he will remain connected to Jesus.

What a powerful message for us who live in this twenty-first century. How often we allow the world and the daily stressors to distract us from what *really counts*. How often we permit anger and fatigue to disrupt the focus of our relationship with Jesus. Christians fail to realize how powerful they are in possessing the *life of Jesus within their souls*. For if man truly believes, if he *really* believes, he (as Jesus told his disciples), could truly move mountains.

"Amen, I say to you, if you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you will say to the mountain, 'be moved,' and it will be moved. Nothing will be impossible for you" (Matthew 17:20).

How often man gives into the demands of the moment, allowing the Prince of this world to get between him and God. In John's account for this Sunday (14:1-12), Jesus begins by telling his disciples that the test of their love will be evidenced in their desire to believe in him. True belief leads to peace at the depth of man's being, at the level of soul.

To love Jesus is to know him and to know him is to know the Father as well. As Jesus departs from his disciples, he reveals in very direct ways his relationship to the Father. Here we see several Trinitarian themes: descriptions that Jesus and the Father are one and the same.

"Jesus said, 'I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me'" (14:6).

"If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and see him" (14:7).

"Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show me the Father?' Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me" (14:9-10)?

Love demands belief. Otherwise the love is insincere and misdirected. Misdirected love is a love for the world and the things of the world, rather than a love that is rooted in God's *Word*. Jesus is God's *Word*.

A relationship with Jesus, like all relationships involves the cultivation of quality time with the other. Friends create a bond between themselves, they dialogue, they get to know the other and they desire to be with the other. In our postmodern society, man has lost the desire to cultivate a relationship with Jesus. The world and its false and fleeting remedies for happiness and wholeness have become more appealing to man than the appeal that comes from Jesus, to come to him and to place his yoke upon man's shoulders.

Jesus promises his disciples that he will make the first move and help them to cultivate a relationship with him, even in his absence. He assures the disciples that he will send the *Advocate*, the *Spirit of Truth* who will not only protect the disciples against the Prince of this world, but will also lead them continuously to himself (14:15-17).



To love Jesus is to believe that he is God. In believing that Jesus is God, man desires to please God by obeying Jesus' request to keep his commandments. This means all the commandments; not just those that fit into man's daily or weekly schedule. The reward for loving God by adhering to the commandments gives man the assurance that Jesus will always be a part of his life. Man will never be left alone, even though at times he *feels* alone.

"If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you forever. This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it [the world] neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you" (14:15-17).



The world, however, cannot see (theorein, from the Greek, meaning having physical or spiritual insight) the Advocate because the Advocate is not corporeal. In addition, the world does not have the spiritual insight as the disciples do and as men and women of faith do. Consequently, the world is blinded to the Truth; thus, exists in darkness and unlike the true disciple is subject to death.

The unbeliever, the one who permits the world to distract him from Jesus, is the one who experiences a troubled (tarasso) heart. The void that exists in the depth of the soul because of a spiritual emptiness results in a feeling of lonesomeness in the midst of and against the forces of the world. In other words, man feels like an orphan without parental support.

Jesus says: "Have faith!" "Believe in me!" "Love me!" "Keep my commandments. And the Father will give you the Advocate; the Spirit of Truth. And I shall not leave you orphaned."

The commandments about which Jesus speaks consist of the whole and entire gospel message. To keep Jesus' commandments means that the true disciple is the individual who loves Jesus and demonstrates this love by *fulfilling* the message of the Gospel. Such a person walks in the Light of Truth, and consequently, radiates Life; a life that reflects the presence of Jesus who abides within. God through Jesus *dwells* in the midst of goodness. Therefore, where there is goodness, man will find the presence of the Christ.



This is not true among those who refuse to listen to God's *Word* or to *fulfill the commandments* of Jesus. For them there is no Light, for such an individual shuns the Light and embraces darkness. Where there is darkness, there is death and where there is death, one finds the *absence* of the divine presence.

Darkness gives rise to and perpetuates self-seeking and consequently, short-lived egocentric types of experiences; all of which give birth to a gospel of materialism and secularism. We find this existing on all levels of society. It points to a world that has strayed from its true identity; having been created in the *image and likeness* of God.

All is not gloom and doom because we are *Easter People*. Jesus has made all things new by dying and rising from the dead. Easter is Jesus' victory over sin and death. To the degree that we *embrace* Easter, to that degree, we participate in an *enduring and ever-present* experience of Jesus as he lives in the here and now.

The *Easter Event* confirms Jesus' presence among the created universe through the presence of the *Advocate* who the Father has sent into the world as confirmation of his loving and enduring presence in and through Jesus. Therefore, to him who fulfills Jesus' commandments and demonstrate love in his relations with others, even his enemies, the presence of the *Spirit* is not only indwelling in his life, but his life also becomes an extension of the Christ in whose image he was created.

"Peace I leave with you, my peace I give you. Not as the world gives, do I give it to you; this is my gift to you" (John 14:27).

What does Jesus mean when he bestows unto his disciples his wish for peace? Jesus does not mean the absence of war, nor does he mean the end of psychological tension. However, in addition, Jesus does not mean the sentimental *hallmark* moment where at one time one is happy and at another moment sad.



"Peace be with you" (John 19:19, 21, 26). Coming from the Greek, the word for peace is *Eirene*. It describes more than the desire for peace on the part of another; it is descriptive of the fullness of goodness, perfection and completeness, devoid of adversity. *Eirene* in Greek mythology describes the goddess of spring who is also the keeper of the gates of heaven.

"Jesus said to them [the apostles], 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, I sent you.' When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained'" (20:21-23).

The Hebrew equivalent of eirene is shalom, which moves one's expression for peace in the life of another beyond completeness and fullness, wishing for the other unconditional goodness. To greet another with the salutation, "shalom aleichem" is to consciously pronounce the full meaning of the word as the sentiment slips from the well-wisher's tongue. "I wish you completeness and wholeness, health, prosperity, harmony of mind, body and spirit, devoid from all conflict, adversity and fear. I wish you every good thing that any one individual can possibly experience in a lifetime in a spirit of love and deep-rooted peace, which begins and ends at your spiritual center at the level of soul."



The peace that Jesus refers to has to do with eternal salvation rooted in the here and now. It is an internal predisposition that man acquires through a *daily living out of* his *faith* in Christ rooted in love (*agape*). Jesus refers to this peace as a *gift* because man receives it without merit. Jesus bestows this peace as a reward for man's love.

To love Jesus means that man keeps the commandments of God about which Jesus speaks. If man does so, "The Father and I will make our dwelling in you" (John 14: 23). The result of this indwelling of Jesus leads to a life in which man lives as an extension of that which abides deep within the soul: the Sprit of the Triune God (the Father, Son and Holy Spirit).

The world cannot give true peace (*eirene*) because the world cannot give what it does not possess. Lasting peace results from a life lived in faith. Such a life cannot be shaken by the trials and tribulations of daily living, but views such as a means for a deeper union with Jesus. Such a faith is rooted in the soul where Jesus dwells. Such a faith can only have its origin in its true source: Jesus Christ.

In a world filled with much unrest and confusion, the gospel message is a real *gift* for finding and maintaining a *lasting link* to Jesus. Find that peace that the world can not give by looking within your soul for the maker of all things good: Jesus Christ. And...once found...sharing it with others! JNM

Melanoma & Health

The summer months can be extremely hot and humid. All the more reason to take special care of our bodies and our skin. Many enjoy being outdoors to feel the sun penetrate its warmth to the body. The sun can provide heat to heal achy bones and the natural sun light promotes improved psychological health. However, excessive heat and exposure to the sun can have a negative impact on the body as well as the skin.




Melanoma of the skin is among the most common cancer types in the United States. It is estimated that 106,110 new cases will be diagnosed in 2021 and 7,180 deaths will occur from this form of cancer. (National Cancer Institute). Approximately 1 in 5 people will develop melanoma in their lifetime, most likely because of increased sun exposure in childhood.



Melanoma is more common in men than women, individuals with fair complexion as well as those who have been exposed to natural or artificial sunlight (tanning beds) over a long period of time. There are more new cases among Caucasians than any other ethnic group. (National Cancer Institute).

Melanoma is the deadliest form of skin cancer. It occurs when pigment making cells in the skin called melanocytes, begin reproducing uncontrollably. Melanoma can come from an existing mole or develop on unblemished skin. The most common type of melanoma spreads on the skin's surface. It is called *superficial spreading melanoma*. It can stay on the surface or it can grow into deeper tissue. Other forms of melanoma can begin anywhere on or inside the body, including under the fingernails, toenails and inside the eye.



The exact cause of all melanomas is unclear, but exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from sunlight or tanning lamps and beds increase the risk of developing melanoma. Limiting exposure to UV radiation can help reduce the risk of getting skin cancer. Melanoma occurs when something goes wrong in the melanin-producing cells (melanocytes) that give color to the skin. Normally, skin cells develop in a controlled and orderly way. Healthy new cells push older cells toward the skin's surface where they die and fall off. If some cells develop DNA damage, new cells may begin to grow out of control and overtime form a mass of cancerous cells.

Symptoms

Melanomas can develop anywhere on the body. Most often the lesion develops in areas that have had exposure to the sun, such as the back, legs, arms and face. Melanomas can also occur in areas that do not receive much sun exposure, such as the soles of the feet, palms of the hands and fingernail beds. These hidden melanomas are more common in people with darker skin.

First Signs and Symptoms of Melanoma

Possible signs and symptoms of melanoma may include such things as: a change in an existing mole; the development of a new pigmented, or unusual looking growth on the skin; colors or shades of skin that are different within the same mole. In addition, the mole may look irregular, rather than smooth. The mole or spot may be mottled with a range of colors such as brown, black, blue, red, white or light grey.

Other signs may include: the diameter of a mole that is larger than 6 millimeters (larger than a pencil eraser); a mole that bleeds, feels numb, or has a crusty surface. I is important to note that melanoma does not always begin as a mole. It can also occur on otherwise normal appearing skin.



Risk Factors

Some risk factors in developing a melanoma include: individuals with fair skin. Such individuals have less pigment (melanin) in the skin, which means less protection from the damaging UV radiation; a history of sunburn; excessive ultraviolet light exposure (i.e., tanning beds); living closer to the equator or at a higher elevation; having many moles or unusual moles. For example, having more than 50 ordinary moles on the body indicates an increased risk of melanoma.

Unusual moles known as *dysplastic nevi* tend to be larger than normal moles and have irregular borders and a mixture of colors. Family history also contributes to the possibility of acquiring moles on the body as well as a weakened immune system.

Diagnosing Melanoma

Physical examination – including a medical history in important in the detection of a melanoma. An excision biopsy of the mole or spot tissue is conducted and then sent to the laboratory for examination. Information from the analysis can determine if the tissue is cancerous and how deep it has grown below the skin's surface. This is the most important factor in predicting whether the cancer can be cured.

Melanomas deeper than 1 millimeter are likely to have spread to nearby lymph nodes. Additional include: blood tests, a chest x-ray, CT scan, MRI, bone scan, lymph node biopsy and ultrasound. **Treatment** for melanoma in the early stages often can be done with surgery alone. However, if the cancer is advanced, immunotherapy, radiation, or chemotherapy may be necessary to irradicate the cancer.

<u>Basal Cell Carcinoma (BCC)</u>- BCCs usually appear as tiny, painless bumps with a pink, pearly surface. As it slowly grows, the center of the bump may become sore and develop into a crater that bleeds, crusts, or forms as a scab. This cancer commonly occurs on the face, ears, back and neck where the skin is exposed to the sun. Basal cell carcinoma begins in the basal cells – a type of cell within the skin that produces new skin cells as old ones die off.

Squamous cell carcinoma (SCC)- SCC usually begin as a small, red, painless lump or skin patch that slowly grows and may develop into a non-healing sore. It usually occurs on the head, ears and hands. This form of cancer is common and develops in the squamous cells that make up the middle and outer layers of the skin.

Most squamous cell carcinomas of the skin result from prolonged sun exposure to ultraviolet radiation, either from sunlight or from tanning beds or lamps. Avoiding UV light helps to reduce the risk of developing squamous cell carcinoma of the skin and other forms of skin cancer.

Prevention

Ways to reduce the risk of melanoma and other forms of skin cancer

Some suggestions for reducing the risk of developing a melanoma and other forms of cancer include: the wearing of sunscreen year- round; use of a broad-spectrum sunscreen with a SPF of at least 30, even on cloudy days; applying sunscreen generously and reapplying it every 2 hours or more often if sweating or when swimming.

It is also important to avoid the sun during the middle of the day. For most people in North America, the sun's rays are the strongest between the hours of 10 am to 4 pm. Schedule outdoor activities for other times of the day, even in the winter or when the sky is cloudy.

It is important to remember that UV radiation is absorbed year-round and the clouds offer little protection from the damaging rays. It is important to wear protective clothing by covering the skin with dark, tightly woven clothes that cover the arms and legs. Wear a broad brimmed hat that provides protection to the face. Sunglasses that block both types of UV radiation (UVA and UVB rays) are a must.

It is important that we become familiar with our skin so that we will notice changes. Examine skin often for new growths or changes in existing moles, freckles, bumps and birthmarks. Use a mirror to check face, neck, ears and scalp. A complete body assessment should be done often to identify any changes. It is important to see a dermatologist yearly or more often if changes in skin or moles are present.

Summer is a time to enjoy outdoor activities. It is important to protect the skin by wearing sunscreen. Be smart and apply sun screen at all times. The skin needs to be protected from the damaging UV rays from the sun. A day at the beach or at the pool can be filled with fun. It is important to protect the eyes by wearing sunglasses. Too much exposure to UV light raises the risk of eye diseases and other problems. Cataracts and eye cancers can take years to develop. Be sure to select sunglasses that provide 100% UV or UV400 protection, or block both UV-A and UV-B rays. Remember that sun rays can pass through clouds and haze. Protect children and senior citizens with hats and sunglasses.

Healthy exposure to sunlight can have positive effects, as long as the eyes and skin are protected from UV damage and over exposure to the sun. **KP**

Mary, May & Fatima

May is traditionally dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Consequently, it is fitting that we spend time reflecting on Mary this weekend as we begin the month of May and look forward to the celebration of *Mother's Day* on May 8, in which we honor not only the Blessed Mother, but all our mothers. Besides being the mother of Jesus, Mary is also *our* mother and as such, is also the *Mother of the Church*. Mary is the *Queen of the Apostles* whose motherhood extends to the apostles. St. John tells us that as Mary stood at the cross with the Beloved Disciple, just prior to Jesus taking his last breath, he [Jesus] entrusts the Beloved Disciple (and the other disciples) to the care of his mother.

"When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple there whom he loved, he said to his mother, 'Woman behold your son.' Then he said to the disciple, 'Behold your mother.' And from that hour the disciple took her into his home" (19:26-27).

The Perfect Disciple

From the earliest of times, Mary has been recognized as the most *perfect* model of the universal Church in the order of *faith*, *charity* and *flawless union* with her Son. For this reason, St. Luke tells us that Mary has been called "Blessed among all other woman" (1:46). Mary represents that *perfect disciple* who cooperated with God's plan for the salvation of humankind. She did so in difficult times, in a social/religious climate not unlike our own with the certainty that God would guide her choices. In bringing forth the Savior of the world, Mary has become throughout all times, worthy of veneration and honor, having been hailed a *model* and *exemplar* for all peoples for all times.

Our Lady of Fatima


Of the hundreds upon hundreds of titles with which our Blessed Mother has been entrusted, none is more noteworthy than the title of *Our Lady of Fatima*, whose feast we celebrate on May 13. Mary received this title as a result of her appearance to three shepherd children near the town of Fatima in Portugal in the year 1917.



The apparition of Fatima is one of the most powerful and one of the most spectacular manifestations of the presence of the Devine in human history. The Blessed Mother appeared to three shepherd children, Lucia, Francisco and Jacinta, six times between May 13 and October 13, 1917. She told the children that God had sent her with a message for all people. Mary entered human history at a time when the world (not unlike 2021), was in the grips of bloody wars, international conflicts and the display of violence and hate on all levels of society, along with deliberate indifference and disregard toward organized religion and the Church.

The Three-Part Secret

The heart of Mary's message to the children, and to the world was confined to what is referred to as the <u>Three-Part Secret</u>. The first part of the <u>Secret</u> consisted of a frightening glimpse of hell, where the souls of "unremorseful sinners go." This first part of the "Secret," also included an urgent plea to the children to pray for these souls, and for other souls that they may be spared of the fires of hell by repenting.



The second part of the Secret was the prediction of the outbreak of the Second World War. This also included Mary's request for the Consecration of Russia as a condition to world peace. The second part of the Secret predicted the triumph of Mary's Immaculate Heart, which would follow Russia's consecration and conversion to the Catholic faith.

The last part of the *Secret* was made public in the year 2000. It is interesting to note that five popes in succession kept the third part of the *Secret of Fatima* locked in a safe in the Vatican. It is also interesting to note that none of the five popes *consecrated the world* to the *Immaculate Heart of Mary* as the Blessed Mother had requested.

It was with Pope John Paul II, on June 30, 2000, that the third part of the Secret was revealed. In relating this secret, Mary told the children that a "An apostle clothed in white, who, while making his way amid the corpses of martyrs, would fall to the ground, apparently dead, under the burst of gunfire." The above description recalled the 1981 assassination attempt against Pope John Paul II, who was wounded in St. Peter's Square when a Turkish gunman, Mehmet Ali Agca opened fire and severely wounded the Holy Father. Later, however, the pontiff forgave Agca who was also pardoned by the Italian authorities at the pope's request.

The shooting came on Wednesday, May 13, sixty-four years to the day, that Mary first appeared to the children at Fatima.

John Paul credited the Blessed Virgin Mary (of Fatima) with intervening and sparing his life. The Holy Father said, "A motherly hand guided the bullet's path, enabling me to halt at the threshold of death."

Miracle of the Sun



On Mary's final visit to the children, on October 13, 1917, just as she had promised, she performed a miracle in order that "the doubters of the world would be convinced of the reality of my presence and the will of God."

During this final appearance, Mary appeared as *Our Lady of Mount Carmel*, accompanied by St. Joseph and the child Jesus. On this day, what has been referred to as *The Miracle of the Sun* took place to the amazement of; approximately seventy thousand spectators.

The sun whirled about and seemed to be plummeting down as it sent off multicolored rays of light. Many feared that it was the end of the world. However, many in the crowd were cured instantly from diseases and disabilities.



The result of these apparitions took shape in the construction of a large shrine where to this day thousands upon thousands of documented miracles have taken place through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary. **JNM**

Noticing the younger priest's inability to unfold the rosebud while keeping it intact, the old pastor began to recite the following poem....


It is only a tiny rosebud, A flower of God's design; But I cannot unfold the petals With these clumsy hands of mine.


The secret of unfolding flowers

Corpus Christi Procession

Sunday, June 11 is the Feast of The Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, commonly known by its former name, Corpus Christi. One of the ancient practices of the Church is a Eucharistic Procession, done on Corpus Christi. This practice dates back to the 13th century, in Cologne, Germany. By the 14th century, this practice had spread throughout Europe. Last year on Corpus Christi, we did a driving procession to all three of our campuses. However, the Eucharistic Procession should be one where the Eucharist, held in a monstrance, is carried through the streets.

So, we will be doing a Eucharistic Procession through the streets of East Haven and New Haven following the 11:15am Mass at St. Vincent de Paul. The procession will begin in the church, and proceed down Bradley Avenue to Francis Street, crossing Gerrish, before making our way to Burr Street where we will continue on all the way to St. Bernadette. Once we arrive at St. Bernadette, we will have adoration, a short reflection, and benediction before the Eucharist is reposed back into the tabernacle. Following benediction, we will have refreshments available either outside the church or over at the Senior Center. The distance of this walk is 1.9 miles, and will take approximately 45 minutes.
