## From the Pastor's Pen

The Parables Revisited:

Laborers in the Vineyard

(Matthew 20:1-16),

Parable of the Two Sons

(Matthew 21-28-32),

Parable of the Tenant Farmers

(Matthew 21:33-43) and

Render to Caesar but Give to God

(Matthew 22:15-21)

## The Parable of the Vineyard

For the past several weekends, Matthew's gospel account has focused our attention on the vineyard. On Sunday, September 24, the twenty-fifth Sunday in ordinary time, we listened as Jesus told a parable about the generous landowner who hired workers to go into his vineyard at various times throughout the day. At the end of the day, all the workers received the same compensation: a full day's wage.

The workers who had put in a full day's labor in the hot sun grumbled because those who were hired in late afternoon received the same payment; thus, the former group believed that they had been cheated by the landowner.



The landowner assured the grumblers that they received exactly what they initially agreed upon when they were hired: a full day's wage. He continued by asking the men if they objected to his generosity and why they thought that he was not entitled to do what he wanted with his own money.



We know that the real meaning of this parable has to do with our worthiness to live-out and demonstrate *kingdom values*. These are the ones who will experience the kingdom of heaven.

The parable and its teaching are actually given by Jesus as a response to Peter's question in the previous chapter:

"Then Peter said in reply, 'Lord, we have left everything and followed you. What then will we have?' Jesus said to them, 'Truly, I tell you, at the renewal of all things, when the Son of Man is seated on the throne of his glory, you who have followed me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And anyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or fields, for my name's sake will receive a hundredfold and will inherit eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first'" (Matthew 19:27-30).



Peter's comment, which reflects the attitude: "Lord, look what we did for you, what's in it for us" is contrary to Jesus' Conditions for Discipleship (Matthew 16:24-26). Those who consider themselves to be followers of Jesus Christ: twenty-first century disciples included, must never doubt for a moment that the sacrifices that they make, or the daily crosses that they carry are never undertaken in vain or without significance in the eyes of God.

Moreover, those who look to be rewarded for possessing faith in God will not only be met with disappointment throughout their lifetime, they will also experience an emptiness; a void at the core of their being due to an inability or refusal to completely disconnect from the world and *re*-connect with God.

This parable is a teaching about God's redemptive love. It is a lesson by Jesus about the *Last Judgment* and how those who *think* that they will have access to the kingdom of God may in fact, be last in God's kingdom, or never experience it at all.

The landowner stands in the place of God in this parable. Moreover, the Greek translation of the word landowner is *kyrios*, meaning *LORD*, which is used to describe the Messiah. Consequently, the reader should realize that the parable is not speaking about proper labor relations. Rather, the parable is teaching about the unconditional mercy and compassion of God for those who at any stage of their lives turn their behaviors and hearts toward God.



The message that Jesus conveys to his listeners and to each of us is focused on:

- •God's unlimited and merciful love,
- •Man's response to God with faith; a faith that is never contingent upon length of time but is understood by God in terms of depth and sincerity.

How often have we, like the workers in the parable looked with envy at another's blessings or good fortune, actually believing that their seemingly good fortunate should be given to us? How often have we resented another's blessings and judged their unworthiness in relation to our presumed worthiness?

The reward for faith in God is not prosperity, or even happiness in this world. Rather, it is found in a life lived in Truth and integrity. When men and women of faith live their lives in search of Truth and with integrity, there are no feelings of emptiness, nor is there evidence of a troubled heart, which results from the feelings of spiritual deprivation. When the trials and tribulations of life come one's way, being men and women of faith, we can weather the storm, forge ahead and move yet another step closer to Christ.

## Parable of the Two Sons

Last Sunday, October 1, the twenty-sixth Sunday of ordinary time, we listened to Jesus tell the story about the man with two sons, both of whom were asked by the father to go and work in his vineyard. The first son initially refused to go but eventually had a change of heart and went. The second son initially agreed to work in the father's vineyard but then decided not to do so.



Jesus continues by telling the Pharisees that the social outcasts of the day would enter into the kingdom of heaven before those who were considered to be righteous. As in the previous parable, Jesus raises the bar with regard to what it takes to merit eternal life. Do our behaviors reflect our love of God? Will we merit access into the kingdom of heaven when we leave this world?

## Parable of the Tenant Farmers

This Sunday, October 8, the twenty-seventh Sunday of ordinary time we listened to what could be the most daunting of the three parables. Once again, the setting is a vineyard. A rich landowner leases his land to tenant farmers who have the responsibility for cultivating the soil and planting the crops (Matthew 21:33-43). It is their responsibility to assure that the vineyard continues to realize a quality harvest in order that the landowner can receive from the tenants what is rightfully due him.



The tenant farmers become greedy. They appear to have an attitude of entitlement, thinking that they are owed more than what they have a right to receive. Not realizing that they are merely occupiers in a land that they have no right to, they fight savagely to take what does not belong to them. At the conclusion of the parable, a scary statement is made by Jesus who states that the vineyard would be taken away and given to a people who can and will produce better fruit.

Is the kingdom of heaven being taken away from man in the twenty-first century as a result of his inability or unwillingness to produce the quality of fruit that is expected from followers of Jesus? Is the present-day apathy and negativity that appears to pervade our post-modern society robbing men and women of faith from focusing on the virtues and values upon which this *One Nation under God* was founded?


Last weekend, I asked the question that is worth another reflection: "Why do we permit a broken, secular and Godless society to rob us from God's gift of faith; a faith that each of us possesses? Perhaps, we have not thought about it in quite this way. Yet, we really do not realize the powerful impact that a negative secular climate has on our psychological and spiritual wellbeing.

## SIGNS OF THE TIMES

Consciously and yet, not so consciously, we continue to permit a disturbed and deluded society to create victims of her citizens. The verbal abuse that continues to define the civil, secular and political arenas smack at a society and a culture in decline.

Two question remains to be answered:

- ♦Do I give to God, on a daily basis, what is due God?" Or do I nurse by broken human spirit, blaming others and society for taking from me that which I perceive to be rightly mine? In so doing, do I then project this hostility and enmity onto others?
- ♦ Could it be that as we look around at a broken world gone mad that the kingdom of heaven is slipping from I spiritual lenses? Could it be that in our obsession on focusing that which is wrong with others and life in general that we as a people have failed to produce the quality of fruit that simultaneously dignifies and defines our created essence? And in so doing, we have failed to read, or mis-read altogether the signs of the time? **JNM**

## Liver Health

October is Liver Cancer Awareness Month. The liver is the largest internal organ in the body, weighing about 3 pounds in an adult. The liver is located on the right side of the abdomen, under the ribs. The size of the liver varies with regard to the height and weight of an individual. The liver is spongy and wedge-shaped gland, reddish-brown in color.



The liver is an essential organ, performing over 500 functions necessary to sustain life. It is a gland because it makes proteins and hormones that other parts of the body need. One of the liver's most important functions is to filter the blood.

## The Liver's Role

The liver has several important functions:

- ♦ Cleans toxins (harmful substances) out of the blood.
- ◆ Produces substances to help blood clot.
- Regulates the amount of blood in the body.
- ♦ Stores glycogen (an energy source) and vitamins to be used by the body at later time.

- ◆Makes bile, a fluid that helps the body digest (break down) food.
- ◆Gets rid of old red blood cells.
- ♦ Metabolizes proteins, carbohydrates and fats so the body can use them.
- ♦Stores iron.
- ♦Helps the body resist infections by making immune factors removing bacteria and toxins from the blood.

## Parts of the liver

The liver has two main parts: the larger right lobe and the smaller left lobe. The lobes contain many blood vessels. The blood travels through the liver. The liver filters (cleans) the blood, removing toxins and waste that eventually exit the body through urine and feces.

The lobes contain thousands of lobules (small lobes). These lobules connect with many bile ducts, i.e., tubes that transport bile from the liver to the small intestine.

## **Symptoms of Liver Disease**

The most common symptom of a liver problem is jaundice. With jaundice, the skin and the white area in the eyes turn yellow because of too much bilirubin in the blood. Bilirubin is a yellow waste product that the liver gets rid of when it breaks down red blood cells. Higher levels of bilirubin indicate a possible problem with the liver.



## **Symptoms of Liver Disease**

Some indicators of a sick liver include the following:

- •Itchy skin
- •Low blood pressure
- •Pain in the abdomen
- •Swelling of the legs or ankles
- •Easy bruising
- •Build-up of fluid in the abdominal area (ascites).
- •Weakness, loss of balance.
- •Constant fatigue.
- •Tremors (shaking).
- •Confusion or loss of orientation

## **Fatty Liver Disease**

Fatty liver disease (steatosis) is a common condition caused by having excessive fat build up in the liver. A healthy liver contains a small amount of fat. It becomes a problem when fat reaches 5% to 10% of the liver's weight.



In most cases, fatty liver disease does not result in any serious problems or prevent the liver from functioning normally. Approximately 7% to 30% of people with the fatty liver disease experience a progression of the disease over time. The progression manifests itself in three stages:

**Stage 1,** The liver becomes inflamed (swollen), which damages its tissue. This stage is called *steatohepatitis*.

**Stage 2,** Scar tissue forms where the liver is damaged. This process is called *fibrosis*.

**Stage 3,** Extensive scar tissue replaces healthy tissue. When this occurs, the individual has *cirrhosis* of the liver.

Cirrhosis of the liver is a result of severe damage to the liver. The hard scar tissue that replaces healthy liver tissue slows down the liver's functioning, eventually blocking liver function entirely. Cirrhosis can lead to liver cancer.

## **Causes of Fatty Liver Disease**

It is possible to contract fatty liver disease without having any pre-existing conditions. Some of the risk factors that may increase the likelihood of developing the disease include: carrying excessive weight, having metabolic syndrome or having Type 2 diabetes

The taking of certain prescription medications such as: amiodarone, diltiazem, tamoxifen or steroids can also contribute to this disease. People with fatty liver disease often have no symptoms until the disease progresses to cirrhosis. If a person does have symptoms, such symptoms may include:

- ♦ Nausea, weight loss, loss of appetite.
- Abdominal pain or a feeling of fullness in the upper right side of the abdomen.
- ◆Yellowish color on skin and in the white area around the pupil of the eyes (jaundice).
- ♦ Weakness.
- ◆Fatigue.
- ♦ Mental confusion.
- ◆ Swollen abdomen and legs (edema).

## <u>Treatment</u>

There is no medication specifically for the treatment of fatty liver disease. The focus is to manage the factors that contribute to the condition. Making lifestyle changes that can improve health include:

- •Avoiding alcohol.
- •Losing weight.
- •Taking medications to manage diabetes, cholesterol and triglycerides.
- •Taking vitamin E and anti-hyperglycemic medications.

## **Prevention**

Steps taken to keep the liver functioning well and reduce the risk for liver disease include:

- •Keeping current with vaccines.
- •Washing hands often, especially after using the bathroom, touching pets and before eating.
- •Limit exposure to toxins, such as cleaning supplies, chemical and tobacco products.
- •Keep cholesterol within normal range.
- •Monitoring one's diet; i.e., eating healthy.
- •Keep blood sugars within normal range, if you have diabetes.
- •Do not smoke or use other tobacco products.
- •Limit alcohol intake.
- •Be care about using medicine. Always talk to a healthcare provider about medications you are taking. This also includes over-the-counter products, such as pain relivers.
- •Avoiding sharing razors, toothbrushes or other personal items.

## Eat Healthy

Eating a healthy, well-balanced diet and maintain a healthy weight is very important not only for the prevention of liver disease but also, for a host of others ailments.

Liver cleanses are not regulated by the FDA and have not been adequately tested in clinical trials. While some of the liver cleanses have been shown to have positive results, *milk thistle* has been shown to decrease liver inflammation and *turmeric extract* has been shown to protect against liver injury.

# FALL IN LOVE WITH TAKING CARE OF YOUR BODY.

There has not been adequate clinical trial data in humans to recommend the routine use of these natural compounds for prevention. It is important to consult with your healthcare provider before taking any supplements or using any colon or liver cleanses.

The best thing a person can do to maintain a healthy liver is to treat it well. Avoid frequent overconsumption of food and alcohol, maintain a healthy diet and exercise regimen, get screened if you have liver disease risk factors. **KP**

The scriptures are very clear about the act of demonstrating charity in our relationships with one another: "Charity comes from a pure heart, a good conscience and a sincere faith" (1Timithy 1:5). The words charity and love are often used interchangeably in the scriptures. They share the same Greek word: agape, which means unconditional respect, unconditional regard and unconditional reverence for another.

The demonstration of charity does not only include the sharing of our possessions or the providing of financial assistance. Charitable behavior, also includes one's outlook on life; one's attitude: am I someone who inevitably looks at the glass half-empty, overlooking the many blessings that God continues to bestow on me? 


