

#### **Unclean Spirits in Saint Mark:**

Demonic Possession: Spiritual Brokenness Mark 1:21-28 1:40-45

As we begin a New Year and a new cycle in the liturgical year of the Church's calendar, we *listen* to the <u>Gospel According to Saint Mark</u>. Mark's gospel account is referred to as the "Gospel of Conflict" because the Jesus in Mark's account, unlike that of Matthew and Luke is confronted early on in his public ministry with evil and conflict. Last weekend, as Jesus begins his public ministry, he enters into a synagogue where Mark tells the reader that Jesus is met by an "unclean spirit" (1:21-28).

Each of us, at one time or another has come into contact with someone whose bizarre and perhaps, ostentatious display of human nature has sparked our curiosity or even offended our human dignity. Few of us, in viewing another's behavior would conclude that such colorful behaviors were abnormal, or as threatening as they might have appeared deserved to be classified as demonic possession.



Throughout the ages, however, even prior to Old Testament times, there existed the belief that man could fall victim to malevolent entities that take control of his body and manipulate his mental processes. Yet, with the advances that have been made in medicine and the behavioral sciences, we who live in the 21<sup>st</sup> century hear very little about demonic possession, at least as it is described in the scriptures.




#### **Demonic Possession**

Demonic or spiritual possession is understood as the state in which an individual is violated by an evil or unclean spirit who takes control of man's body and of his cognitive functioning. Characteristics of possession include psychosomatic occurrences that involve the alteration and distortion of the individual's speech, self-mutilating gestures, the display of abnormal strength and exaggerated bodily functions.

In the 21<sup>st</sup> century, we are less inclined to identify spiritual possession as a common explanation for the behaviors described above, which resemble or mimic what was in less sophisticated times considered to be symptoms of demonic possession. Rather, in today's world, some of the very same symptoms that were at one time considered to be signs of possession are now classified as psychosis, including schizophrenia, dissociative identity disorders, Tourette Syndrome as well as various forms of delusional behaviors.

The symptoms of demonic possession, which have always included lewd and obscene types of mannerisms, are often associated with mental disorders, or merely inappropriate and anti-social behaviors. Seizures or convulsive kinds of behaviors, for example, are understood to be associated with epilepsy. Personality changes or severe mood swings are associated with hysteria, schizophrenia, or other dissociative or delusional disorders.



The Existential schools of thought such as Logotherapy recognize that some disturbances are *noogenic* in origin, which means that they have their origin in man's soul; more specifically man's <u>dis</u>-connect from self, from others, from God. The Christian Church has always viewed demonic possession with caution and perhaps, even fearful skepticism. While the scriptures provide an interpretation of the power of the underworld, the Church has always maintained that given man's free will, no evil entity can gain access to man's soul directly without some kind of conscious and willful invitation on the part of the individual.

Consequently, given her position, the Church has always associated spiritual possession with man's vulnerable and indifferent human spirit. In other words, when man loses his ability to cope with personal problems; thus, gives into the negative external forces around him, he consciously and unconsciously permits negative energy to manipulate and alter his behavior, his choices and his attitude. This kind of scenario is reiterated throughout the Old and New Testaments.

#### **Unclean Spirits in the New Testament**

Demonic possession, as it is recorded in the New Testament is described not only in terms of the invasion of an evil entity; it also, metaphorically describes man's state of helplessness and hopelessness, which is experienced when met with physical disabilities or mental anguish. In Christ's time, it was common for individuals to be labeled as spiritually possessed by an unclean or demonic spirit when there was no other explanation for the display of what society considered to be bizarre and/or abnormal behavior.

The individuals in the New Testament who are described as being possessed by a demon or an unclean spirit have one thing in common; they all have the experience of emptiness and helplessness. These individuals have been condemned by society and sentenced to a life lived in seclusion and in isolation; separate from others as a type of punishment for being different.



Mark is very forthcoming with regard to Jesus' interaction with those afflicted with unclean and unwelcomed spirits. According to Mark, the importance of the exorcisms performed by Jesus signifies the *powerlessness of evil when confronted by goodness*. In other words, Jesus performs these exorcisms as a way of showing man that no power, whether human or diabolical can restrict man's spirit. Although the human spirit can undergo *spiritual amnesia* leading to spiritual death, it can never be destroyed.

There are numerous individuals who seek Jesus out for healing, many of whom, Mark will introduce to us throughout his account in the weeks and months ahead. Such individuals have given into the external forces around them in a desperate attempt to satisfy the feelings of brokenness, incompleteness and emptiness. This is the feeling of desolation that exists at the core of their spiritual unconscious; at the level of their very soul.

In other words, this kind of existential emptiness is descriptive of individuals who have lost their way; lost the ability or the willingness to discover and to cultivate meaningful experiences. They have lost their will to meaning. When meaning is no longer hidden from man and man begins to discover meaning in this life (i.e., something to live for and something to hope for), purpose emerges and is actualized in the pursuit of positive goals.

#### MY ANXIETIES HAVE ANXIETIES.



Lack of purpose results in the erosion of man's human dignity. Consequently, when man loses a reason for living and doing, he knowingly exposes himself to the powers and even the *principalities* that seek his demise. The feeling of emptiness that so often contributes to personal brokenness, which leads to anger, depression, indifference and apathy results in man's *perceived* belief that his only remedy for happiness is from the world. Consequently, man begins to look for *quick-fix-feel-good-fast-solutions*, which serve only as temporary forms of relief that when depleted return man to his original state of hopelessness and despair: thus, an addiction is born.

#### The Resilient Human Spirit

Despite the intrusion of evil or the onset of addictive disorders, the human spirit can *never* be altered or destroyed. Having been created in the image and likeness of God, the soul, which provides nourishment to the human spirit, *yearns* consciously and unconsciously for oneness and completeness with God. This is why Christ, in addressing this existential malaise in those who approach him for healing, speaks first to the inherent transcendent aspect of the individual him/herself, which when rekindled, can provide healing and completeness to the whole person.



As with the Samaritan woman and the blind Bartimaeus whom we meet in John's gospel account on the third and fourth Sundays in Lent, Jesus approaches each of the *spiritually depressed* individuals, <u>not</u> with their physical distortions as his focus. Rather, Jesus looks at the spiritual *dis-*ease; the individual's broken human spirit and the discord and the disconnect that is present at the level of his/her soul.

Whether we classify this as a psychological depression, spiritual possession by an unclean spirit or the evidence of an existential void, the remedy is the same: a spiritual <u>re</u>-awakening leading to self-transcendence. Jesus approaches each individual in Mark's gospel account with love and with unconditional acceptance, without prejudice and without fear of contamination. Addressing their spiritual <u>dis</u>-ease, he relates to them as "soul meeting soul."

#### The Gadarene Demoniac (Mark 5:1-20)

In a few weeks, Mark will recount the story of the Gadarene demoniac who exemplifies that which can happen to man when he has given up because of feelings of hopelessness and despair. Believing that he has no future, man relinquishes his freedom and responsibleness. Having given into the powers outside of himself, he permits his spirit to become buried by the external forces around him. This leads to the smothering of his spirit by a deprecating and demoralizing society, which holds man's spirit captive.



Mark indicates that the man referred to as the Gadarene demoniac lived isolated in the tombs. The tombs were the burial places of dead men's bones; thus, a place of impurity. The Jews in Jesus' time looked upon tomb-dwelling with abhorrence, as a sign of insanity. Yet, man caught in the experience of an existential void feels just like the Gadarene demoniac: empty and hopeless, lacking control over his life and consumed by outside forces.

A buried human spirit renders man spiritually dead. Having lost his dignity, man views himself as futureless; thus, he is condemned to live life as a living corpse. Only Matthew mentions the presence of two possessed men, and Luke makes mention of the fact that the man is naked. In other words, in the absence of man's recognition of and desire for spiritual connectiveness, man loses the finer qualities of human nature, such as love, charity, respect and reverence in relation to the other. Appearing naked, the Gadarene demoniac is devoid of all modesty.



The Gadarene demoniac becomes a metaphor for post-modern man living in the 21<sup>st</sup> century because the more buried the human spirit becomes by the world as a result of man's indifference toward his fellow man and toward a relationship with the Divine, the greater the chance for an unclean spirit to afflict man by filling the void in man (which was initially created by man's feelings of meaninglessness) with addictive-like dependence on the *things* of the world.

Jesus addresses the man by name in an attempt to reawaken the seduced human spirit. "What is your name?' Jesus asked" (Mark 5:9). Mark indicates that Jesus exorcises the unclean spirit from the man after which the man requests to become Jesus' follower. However, with the man's self-discovery and a renewed desire for meaning, man discovers a new mission. This is a mission that will take him from the emptiness of the tombs to the experience of self-transcendence. The man returns to the community, just as the Samaritan woman returned to her community, both individuals giving testimony to the experience of God in their midst; thus, proclaiming and living their new-found faith in the as a result of their experience with Jesus.

#### Demoniac at Capernaum (Mark 1: 23-28)

Like the Gadarene demoniac, the demoniac at Capernaum characterizes man in the grips of the forces outside of himself. Unlike the Gadarene demoniac, however, this man is not in the tombs, but encounters Jesus in the synagogue.



"And immediately there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit; and he cried out, 'What do you want to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us?' Jesus rebuked him" (Mark 1:23-26).

Luke says that the man was possessed by an "unclean demon" (4:33). He also states that the demon threw the man into a convulsive state. However, only Luke says that "the demon had thrown him down in the midst, and he came out of him, having done him no harm" (Luke 4:35).

Two interesting aspects of this account are important for our reflection on our spiritual lives:

- •The first has to do with the possessed man's presence in the synagogue.
- •The second, with the fact that when hurled to the ground in a convulsive state, Luke makes the point that the man was unharmed.

Like the Gadarene demoniac, this man at Capernaum has given up all hope for healing and wholeness. However, the very fact that he is described as being in the synagogue testifies to man's resilient human spirit. Man's spiritual nature *yearns* for wholeness and as such speaks to the fact that regardless of the psycho-somatic constraints that are placed upon man, the human spirit can never be diminished or destroyed.



As indicated above, the human spirit needs only a *spark* to propel it into consciousness. Although self-absorbed because of the invasion of evil, the human spirit is propelled into activity having absorbed the religious *ambience* of the synagogue. Perhaps, it was the sound of chanters, the mystical feeling of solitude, the smell of incense, or the presence of the ancient parchment depicting the *Word* of God. It was the experience of the mystical that *re-minded* the possessed man that he had a spiritual center that yearns for healing.

# SPIRITUAL AWAKENING

Once the spiritual unconsciousness is <u>re</u>-awakened, the human spirit propels itself in the <u>re</u>-discovery of the unconscious God within man's soul. In addition, man begins to discover meaningful avenues for achieving wholeness. This is why the possessed man was unharmed when hurled into a convulsive state. Once man discovers the spiritual energy within his *soul*, opportunities for meaning are endless.

Albert Einstein says it best: "The most beautiful and most profound emotion we can experience is the sensation of the mystical. It is the sower of all true science. He to whom this emotion is a stranger, who can no longer wonder and stand rapt in awe, is as good as dead. To know that what is impenetrable to us really exists, manifesting itself as the highest wisdom and the most radiant beauty, which our dull faculties can comprehend only in their primitive forms----this knowledge, this feeling, is at the center of true religion"

Use this this Lenten Season to re-awaken the Spirit within you! JNM

## Annual Physical: A Second Look

With the flu season upon us and the resurgence of the COVID knocking on our doors, I feel it worthwhile to take a second look at the importance of an annual physical. In the course of my day, I see many individuals, actually too many who tell me that a) they do not have a primary physician and/or b) they do not take the time for scheduling an annual physical. Our health; good health is everything and you know as well as I that when we are feeling good, there us nothing that we cannot tackle on a daily basis.



Now that the New Year has begun it is time to schedule an appointment with the doctor for a physical exam. Most people who are feeling well, often do not think it is important to have an annual physical. People generally see the doctor when feeling ill. Consequently, at that office visit, the doctor focuses on the complaint and makes recommendations for treatment; thus, an assessment by the doctor is made precisely focusing on the specific ailment for which the appointment was made. This would usually be a short visit with the focus on treating the overt symptom.

The doctor does not have the time at a sick visit to perform a physical exam or does the insurance company want to pay for a sick visit along with a wellness physical on the same day. A physical exam provides an opportunity to check one's overall health. It is a time to discuss possible lingering health concerns that the patient might have and in addition, such a meeting opens the door for asking about general health/wellness concerns or questions.



Think of your healthcare provider as your partner in your long-term health. It is important to have a trusted primary care provider that you can talk to you about your concerns; whether these concerns are in the area of mental health issues/changes in family history or any other health concerns that may arise and for which you want answers.

The actual physical exam serves as a wellness check to touch base with the doctor, address any health problems and to discuss preventative measures for the future. It is a time for the doctor to reconnect with the patient and for you, the patient with your physician.



#### The Physical Exam

What should happen at a physical exam? The annual check-up with the primary care provider combines two main factors: 1) talking through the patient's recent health history and the changes or concerns that have occurred since the last visit, and 2) the actual physical exam.

#### 1. Review Health History

This is the time to brief the provider one's recent health history. Use this time as an opportunity to bring up any changes in family health history and any concerns you have. The doctor will likely quiz you about lifestyle behaviors. The doctor will also check on vaccination status and update personal and family health history.

#### 2. Vital Signs

These are some vital signs that are checked by the doctor:

#### •Blood Pressure

Less than 120 over less than 80 is normal blood pressure. Doctors define high blood pressure (hypertension) as 130 over 80 or higher.

#### •Heart rate

Values between 60 and 100 are considered normal. Many healthy people have heart rates slower than 60.

#### •Respiration Rate

From 12 to 16 breaths per minute is normal for a healthy adult. Breathing more than 20 times per minute can suggest heart or lung problems.

#### • Temperature

98.6 degrees Fahrenheit is the average. Healthy people can have resting temperatures slightly higher or lower.

#### •General Appearance

The doctor gathers a large amount of information about the person and health by merely watching and talking to the individual. How is the memory and mental quickness? Does the skin appear healthy? Can a person stand and walk easily?

#### •Heart Exam

Listening to the heart with a stethoscope, a doctor might detect an irregular heartbeat, a heart murmur or other clues that suggest heart disease.

#### •Lung Exam

Using a stethoscope, the doctor listens for crackles, wheezes or decreased breath sounds. These and other sounds are clues to the presence of heart or lung disease.

#### •Head and Neck Exam

Opening up and saying "ah" shows off the throat and tonsils. The quality of the teeth and gums, it also provides information about the patient's overall health. Ears, nose, sinuses, eyes, lymph nodes, thyroid and carotid arteries may also be examined.

#### • Abdominal Exam

The doctor can use a range of examination techniques including taping the abdomen to detect liver size and presence of abdominal fluid, listening for bowel sounds with a stethoscope and palpating for tenderness.

#### •Neurological Exam

Nerves, muscle strength, reflexes, balance and mental status may be assessed.

#### • Dermatological Exam

Skin and nail findings could indicate a dermatological problem or disease somewhere else in the body.

#### •Extremities Exam

The doctor will look for physical and sensory changes. Pulses can be checked in the arms and legs. Examining joints can assess for abnormalities.

#### Male Physical Exam

A man's annual physical exam might include:

- 1. <u>Testicular Exam</u> The doctor can assess for lumps, tenderness, or changes in size. Most men with testicular cancer notice a growth before seeing a doctor.
- 2. Hernia Exam The famous "turn your head and cough" checks for a weakness in the abdominal wall between the intestines and scrotum.
- 3. <u>Prostate Exam</u> Inserting a finger in the rectum lets the doctor feel the prostate for its size and any suspicious areas.

#### Female Physical Exam

A woman's annual exam might include:

- 1. Breast Exam Feeling for abnormal lumps may detect breast cancer or benign breast conditions. The doctor will check the lymph nodes in the underarm area and look for visual abnormalities of the breasts and nipples.
- 2. <u>Pelvic Exam</u> The pelvic exam allows examination of the vulva, cervix, uterus and ovaries. A Pap test and HPV test can screen for cervical cancer and help assess risk.

#### **Laboratory Tests**

There are no set standard laboratory tests during an annual physical. Some doctors will order certain routine tests which are:

- •Complete blood count
- •Chemistry panel
- •Urinalysis (UA)

A lipid panel is ordered if risk factors are present. Abnormal cholesterol levels can increase the risk for heart attacks and strokes. Most healthy adults should have their cholesterol checked at least every 4 to 5 years; more often if the patient has a history of high cholesterol or heart disease.

If an individual is overweight or has risk factors for diabetes, the blood sugar will likely be checked. The American Diabetes Association recommends that all adults age 45 should be tested regardless of weight.

The CDC recommends that everyone over the age of 18 get screened at some point for hepatitis C.



#### **Colorectal Cancer**

At age 45, it is time to begin regular screening for <u>colorectal</u> <u>cancer</u>. People who have immediate family members with colorectal cancer or other risk factors may need to be screened before age 45.

#### **Mammogram Screening**

For some women, age 40 marks the time to begin annual mammogram screening for breast cancer. The American Cancer Society recommends that that women ages 40 to 44 should have the choice to start mammograms if they wish to do so. Women age 45 to 54 should get mammograms every year while women 55 and older can switch to mammograms every 2 years, or can continue yearly screening.

It is important for females to speak with their doctor about when to start and how often to get a mammogram.



Healthy behaviors work far better than medicine at preventing illness and disease. The good news is that healthy behaviors do not require a prescription!

#### What Can I do?

Engage in brisk walking or other exercise 30 minutes most days of the week (approximately 150 minutes a week). Add in strength training at least twice per week. The risk for cardiovascular disease, diabetes and some types of cancer will decrease significantly. And eat a mostly plant-based diet, low in animal fats.

Exercising, maintaining a healthy weight and not smoking are enough to keep most people healthy. Managing stress and getting 7 to 8 hours of sleep all help to maintain good health. Taking the time to go for a physical exam each year and keeping up with preventative health screenings/tests are important ways to care for the body in order to remain healthy (webmd.com).

# Lenten Regulations for Fasting and Abstinence

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence from meat

The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 to 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding from age 14 upwards.


