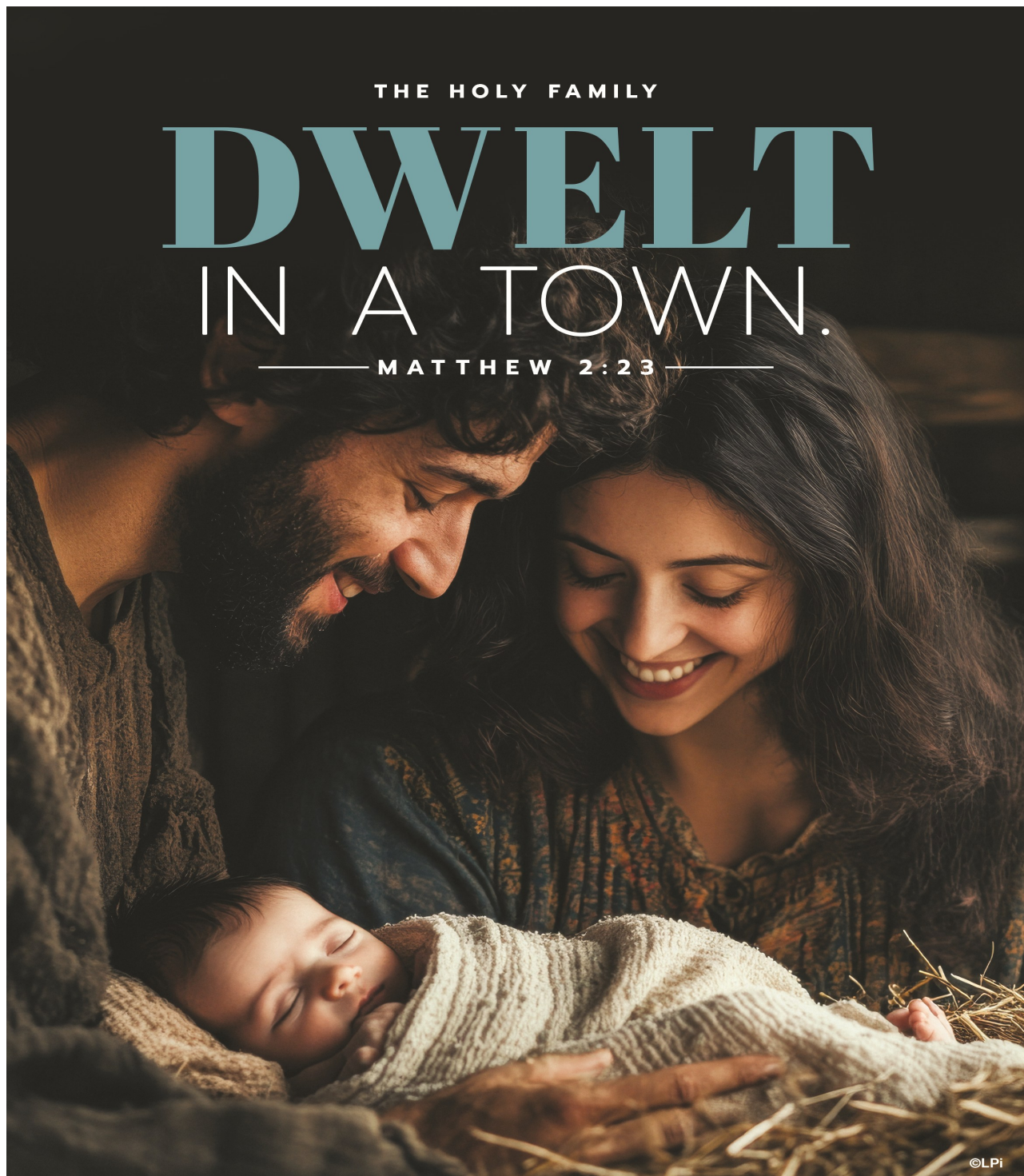

A continued reminder about the Mass modifications that will take place. First is that the 8:00a.m. Mass at St. Vincent de Paul Church on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, and the 8:00am Mass at St. Bernadette Church on Thursday will be at 9:00a.m. starting January 5, 2026. The Friday Mass and the first Saturday Mass at St. Bernadette Church will remain at 8:00a.m.

The other change concerns the vigil Masses. The four o'clock Mass will be at St. Vincent de Paul Church for the months of January through June (except on Holy Saturday) then the four o'clock Mass will be at Our Lady of Pompeii from July to December. Starting January 3, 2026, the 5:30 pm vigil Mass will begin at 5:00pm, PROVIDED THAT THERE REMAIN TWO at St. Pio Parish.

The 5:00p.m. Mass will be at Our Lady of Pompeii Church from January to June (except on Holy Saturday), and then will be at St. Vincent de Paul Church from July to December.

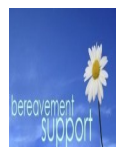

birth of the Christ Child so special.

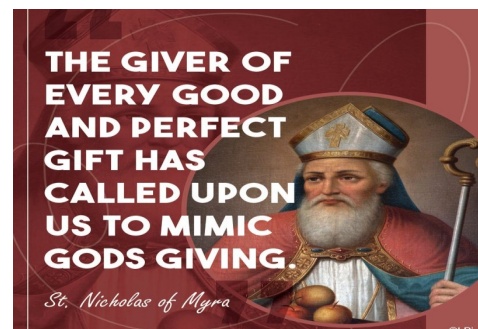

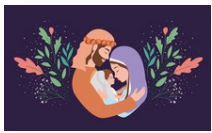

December 28, 2025
The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and
Joseph
Matthew 2:13-15, 19-23

When I was ten, my dad gathered our family around the table in small-town Vermont and told us we were moving to the big desert city of Phoenix, Arizona. We were leaving behind family, friends, and everything familiar. None of us knew what to expect.

But something beautiful happened. As we made the move together, our family grew closer. In retrospect, I'm amazed at my parents' courage to go on that adventure. Even as a kid I realized our family found, in that challenge, a deeper unity and mutual love.

In today's Gospel, Joseph is told: "Rise, take the child and his mother, and flee..." (Matthew 2:13, 20). First to Egypt, then later to Israel. The Holy Family is frequently challenged to move and change, to adapt to God's will for them, in order to find safety in the midst of threat. It's not just an idiosyncratic story about survival. It's a spiritual pattern for all of us. Every Christian family is called to be a kind of sanctuary, especially in a world full of noise, busyness, and fear.

May I make a practical application for us? The Lord's Day, Sunday, is perhaps the most practical way we imitate this dynamic we see in Joseph and his family. Sunday is not meant to be just like every other day, filled with errands and stress. It's meant to be a day set apart; a holy "escape" into rest, worship, joy, and peace. A day to rise, take your family, and flee, into God's presence.

She Kept All of These Things in Her Heart

"What was my first word? Who was there when I was born? When did I start to walk? Which toys did I play with? What made me cry when I was a baby?"

My oldest has reached the age where she has started to ask questions like this. As she grows up, she is realizing that, in order to understand the world around her, she must first understand herself. This makes her insatiably curious about her own identity, her history — her "origin story," as they say in the movies.

I've got most of it documented either in writing or in photos, but even if it's a detail that wasn't scribbled in a baby book or saved to my digital cloud, it's a memory that I can quickly summon and make real for her as we snuggle and talk about who she was, who she is, and who she may become.

I'm the mom. I have kept all of these things in my heart.

The Blessed Mother knew more about God before opening a book than most of us could discover after a lifetime of study and prayer. There is no one whose knowledge of Christ was so intimate, so deep, so simultaneously ordinary and extraordinary, as the human woman who bore him, birthed him, nursed him, raised him and eventually gave him up.

In the way that I can tell my daughter everything there is to know about the part of her life she cannot recall, Mary can tell us everything we need to know about Christ. All we have to do is ask.

ST. LUCIAN'S RESIDENCE COUNTS 100 YEARS OF SENIOR **LIVING WITH** **SPIRITUAL PERKS**

Monsignor Lucian Bojnowski, who served as a pastor to the Polish community in New Britain beginning in 1895, was an enterprising priest who dreamed of many ministries to uplift the locals. As pastor of Sacred Heart Parish, he founded a congregation of religious women, two grade schools, an academy, an orphanage and a home for the elderly.

One of his creations that continues to care for God's people to this day is St. Lucian's Residence, a residential senior living facility, which celebrated its 100th anniversary this year (1925 to 2025).

"He had an incredible vision," Robert Skarba, administrator of St. Lucian's Residence, says of Monsignor Bojnowski. Today, that vision is summarized in St. Lucian's Residence logo with the tagline "comfort, care and compassion."

"The ministry of St. Lucian's is a priority of the Daughters of Mary of the Immaculate Conception," says Sister Mary Janice Zdunczyk, a member of the congregation and director of St. Lucian's, who is in charge of providing that compassionate care. "It's our mission to support St. Lucian's financially, spiritually and socially."

Today, six sisters make their home at St. Lucian's Residence, a nonprofit residential senior living facility that welcomes people

age 65 and above. The sisters live on one floor of St. Lucian's Residence, while 15 lay people live on the floors below.

"I think our founder's purpose was to found a community with a faith dimension," Sister Mary Janice explains. "With that added spiritual dimension, the sisters are willing to share their community life with the lay people and vice versa."

"It's amazing how many residents join the sisters in prayer, holy hours and at various prayer services," Sister Mary Janice notes.

There is also a chapel, which draws the residents for daily Mass. Masses are celebrated by Father Lawrence Symolon, chaplain for the Daughters of Mary of the Immaculate Conception. While this spiritual legacy is being carried on, some things have changed.

Located on Burritt Street, St. Lucian's Residence was built in 1925 and gained a new wing in 1986, followed by many upgrades. Residents enjoy private rooms but can mingle in sitting rooms on every floor, in the dining hall and in a large social activity room.

Activities include exercise classes, bingo, movies and holiday parties. Meals, assistance with medication, laundry and other services are also available, if needed.

Resident Kasimier (Kaz) Marchut, a former long-distance runner, takes advantage of the weekly exercise classes. He also loves to read. "I've read every book in the library," he says, of the small library with English and Polish titles. But he says the best thing about living at St. Lucian's is "having good friends."

Luc A. Ouellette spent his working life as a Catholic school teacher at St. Ann Jr. High School and Sacred Heart School in New Britain, teaching reading, French and religion. He says he arrived at St. Lucian's because "I needed some things done for me – laundry and food prep."

Ouellette loves everything about St. Lucian's: "The schedule for meals, the quiet time in the building, the activities planned for us, the daily Mass and the rosary on Wednesday after Mass and on Sunday afternoons."

Three years ago, Sister Mary Lucille Banach, one of the Daughters of Mary and a retired nurse, moved from Boston to become a resident. "The best is the socialization. There are people around to talk to – or not talk to," she says with a laugh.

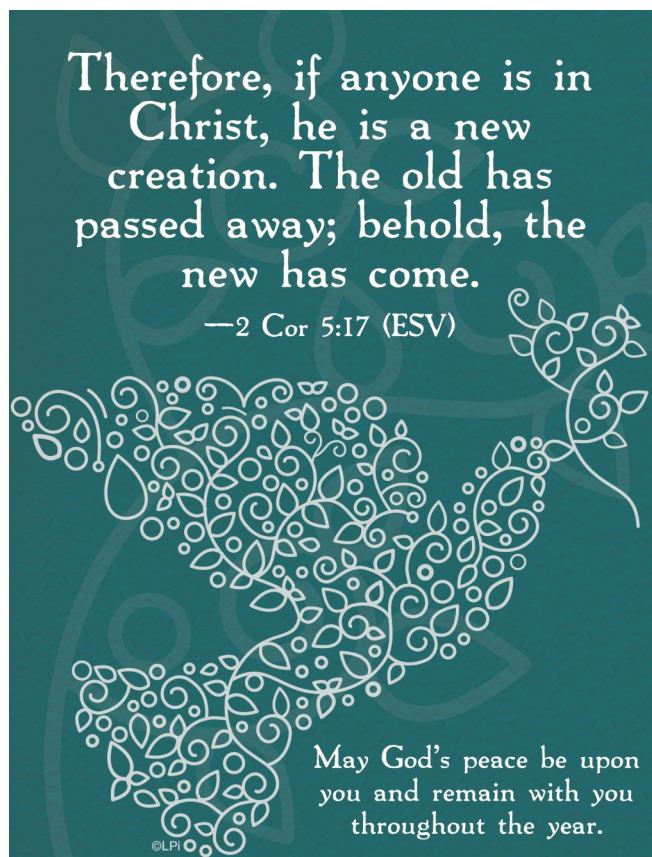
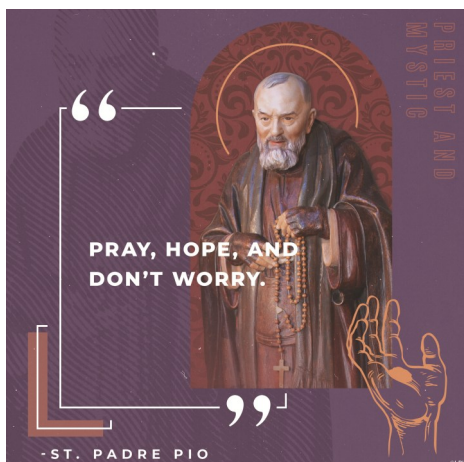
